

president's report



ON-FIELD

This year we fielded 15 Junior teams in the Sydney Junior Rugby Union metropolitan competition, from U10s to U16s. Two of these teams were blended with our fellow village clubs Manly (U13s) and Seaforth (U16s).

We also fielded 14 Minis teams (U6 to U9) in the local Manly Warringah competition.

In all, 421 boys registered to play, a 10% increase on last year's numbers and a vote of confidence in our club, which is positioning itself well for future years.

Success on the field is not always judged by the number of premierships, grand final appearances or points scored for and against, but also by the number of boys who continue to commit to training on wet evenings and muddy grounds, parents prepared to travel to all points around Sydney to play the game we enjoy, and the sportsman-like behaviour demonstrated by coaches and parents each and every week. These traits build the foundations of the moral fabric that our boys will take with them into the future. It is dependant upon strong leadership from active role models and mentors, both male and female, and positive parental guidance, without which the Harlequins would not be the club we are today.

As a club, we achieved some notable distinctions

- 7 teams in Cup Grand Finals (won 5)
- 5 teams in Plate Grand Finals (won 3)
- 56 players were selected for Manly District representative teams; and the U11 rep team, which included 12 Harlequins players, won the State Championship
- 3 players were selected for the U15s Northern and Southern Zone representative teams; and

- one of these players, Marcus Cutler, was selected in the NSW side
- an U16s player, Sam Duke, was selected in the Northern Zone representative team

OFF-FIELD

Much of our success on the field has come about because we inherited a strong volunteer ethic and governing principles from former committee members. As the club has grown, we have also set in place an environment of continuous improvement to challenge existing processes and procedures. To this end, the Harlequins employed a part-time administrator at the start of the year to ease the burden carried by a few volunteers for so long. As with most new initiatives, teething problems occurred, job descriptions became blurred and duplication became apparent, but we pushed through and the end result was a successful transition towards a semi-professional sports organisation.

As a growing club, and by virtue of our size, we also became aware that a number of our parents had, and continue to deal with, serious health issues. As a committed community organisation, the Harlequins will always be available to provide comfort, support and assistance to our members. At times like this, it also allows us to reflect on what is truly important and to ensure we approach all aspects of our life in a positive and balanced way.

With club growth comes an increased need for adequate training facilities, equipment and appropriately positioned storage facilities. Our off-field joint venture with the North Curl Curl Knights allowed us to increase our on-field presence with a community partner whose existing facilities were under-utilised. This process was made possible through the support of Knights representatives Les Elliot (President) and Mark Messenger (Secretary), who understood and shared our views as to what the joint venture could provide to the members of both clubs, and who approached the agreement in an open-minded and flexible way.

We welcomed Dee Why Returned Services League as new sponsors of the club. Along with our existing



Finally, as we look forward to the 2012 season, I hope you all enjoy the summer and come back refreshed and eager to embrace the challenges ahead with equal amounts of laughter, fun and most of all a sense of perspective that we all need for children's sport.

The club recorded a net surplus for the current year of \$17.701 (2010 \$20.410). This enabled the club to increase its bank balance and term deposits to \$142,382 (2010

The club's gross profit and other income increased by 25% to \$92,163 (2010 \$73,852), derived from:

Key factors in deriving this income were:

- Higher registration fees of \$48,352 (2010 \$34,801). Registration fees were increased this year to cover Club Administrator costs and parent membership fees for Dee Why RSL.
- Increase in gross profit from trading to \$17,882 (2010 \$11,061). This was largely due to the hosting of trial matches, semi-finals and finals. (Last year, Grand Final hosting rights were donated to the Manly Rep U11 & U12 NZ tour party). Canteen storage and refrigeration facilities permitted more bulk buying opportunities and less wastage, resulting in an increase in gross profit margin from 40% to 51%.
- Increase in sponsorship to \$21,000 (2010 \$19,350) with the addition of new sponsor Dee Why RSL Club.
- Harlequins Cup gala day income of \$5,659 (2010) \$3,769), which continues to be a key fundraising event. (Canteen revenue and expenses are reported under Trading Profit and have been estimated based on GP% for comparative purposes. Bendigo Bank sponsorship of \$1,000 is included in sponsorship
- Lower fundraising income due to non-participation in Freshwater Fair (2010 \$2,866).

Club expenses increased by \$22,205 (39%) to \$78,637 (2010 \$56.432). The main drivers of this increase were:

- Introduction of Club Administrator position (\$12.000).
- Medallions, trophies & awards increased to \$7,684 (2010 \$4,159) due to renewal of Minis game day trophies, an increase in player numbers and an upgrade in quality.
- Clothing \$24,809 (2010 \$20,878) due to renewal of club jerseys.
- Rent to North Curl Curl Knights \$2,200 (2010 \$750), allowing full use of the canteen.
- Pre-season 10-Year Strategy Day (\$2,418), not incurred last year.
- DY RSL membership fees (\$2,035), not incurred

These increases were partially offset by reductions in coaching and training fees (down \$1,630), rep payments (down \$2,750) and donations (down \$1,339).

Capital expenditure comprised canteen fitout costs (\$2,080), soft drink fridge (\$3,025) and new corner posts, poles and goal post pads (\$3,478).

I would like to thank Andrew Gourley for his ongoing and generous support of the club, including the conduct of the independent review of our accounts.

a) income and expenditure of the club for the year ended 30 September 2011; and

SCOPE



These procedures do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, thus the level of assurance is less than given in an audit.

Based on my review, I have not become aware of any matter that makes me believe that the 2011 Financial Report of Harbord Harlequins Rugby Club does not give a true and fair view of the Club's financial position as at 30 September 2011 and of its performance for the year ended on that date.


